How to use the Old Testament in Daily Prayer

In France I once saw a statue carved out of a huge tree trunk. The statue portrayed the young boy, Jesus, sitting on Joseph's lap. Joseph had his arms outstretched around Jesus holding out before both of them a scroll and together, with mouths in full voice, they were singing the Psalms in prayer.

By praying the Psalms with his foster father, Jesus came to know the love and kindness of his eternal Father, and so came to know that he was truly the Father's Son. The Psalms and Canticles of the Old Testament are to be foundation of our Christian prayer – of praying to the Father in union with Jesus through the power of the Holy Spirit.

Any of us who have prayed the Psalms know that they express the whole range of human emotions and feelings – joy, sadness, fear, love, praise, anger, etc. We tend to gravitate to those Psalms that express the emotion that we are presently experiencing. If we are sad because of the death of a loved one, we pray Psalm 23, "The Lord is my shepherd;/ there is nothing I lack."

However, the Psalms and Old Testament Canticles are to be used not only for expressing our various changeable emotions, but they also are to teach us how to pray and to foster prayerful Christian hearts and minds after the manner of Jesus. For example, few of us long for the presence of God as we ought, yet a number of the Psalms engender within us this very longing.

O God, you are my God—
it is you I seek!
For you my body yearns;
for you my soul thirsts,
In a land parched, lifeless,
and without water. (Ps. 63:2).

Cómo usar el Antiguo Testamento en la oración diaria

En Francia vi una vez una estatua tallada en un enorme tronco de árbol. La estatua representaba al joven, Jesús, sentado en el regazo de José. José tenía sus brazos extendidos alrededor de Jesús sosteniendo ante ambos un rollo y juntos, con la boca en plena voz, estaban cantando los Salmos en oración. Al orar los Salmos con su padre adoptivo, Jesús llegó a conocer el amor y

la bondad de su Padre eterno, y así llegó a saber que él era verdaderamente el Hijo del Padre. Los Salmos y Cánticos del Antiguo Testamento deben ser el fundamento de nuestra oración cristiana, de orar al Padre en unión con Jesús a través del poder del Espíritu Santo.

Cualquiera de nosotros que hemos rezado los Salmos sabemos que expresan toda la gama de emociones y sentimientos humanos: alegría, tristeza, miedo, amor, alabanza, ira, etc. Tendemos a gravitar hacia aquellos Salmos que expresan la emoción que estamos experimentando actualmente. Si estamos tristes por la muerte de un ser querido, oramos el Salmo 23, "El Señor es mi pastor; no hay nada que me falte".

Sin embargo, los Salmos y los Cánticos del Antiguo Testamento deben usarse no solo para expresar nuestras diversas emociones cambiantes, sino que también deben enseñarnos cómo orar y fomentar corazones y mentes cristianas en oración a la manera de Jesús. Por ejemplo, pocos de nosotros anhelamos la presencia de Dios como deberíamos, sin embargo, varios de los Salmos engendran dentro de nosotros este mismo anhelo.

Oh Dios, tú eres mi Dios, ¡eres a ti a quien busco! Por ti mi cuerpo anhela; por ti mi alma tiene sed, en una tierra reseca, sin vida y sin agua. (Sal. 63:2).

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How is the Lectionary arranged?

The Lectionary is arranged in two cycles, one for Sundays and one for weekdays.

The Sunday cycle is divided into three years, labeled A, B, and C. 2021 was Year B, 2022 is Year C, Year A will begin on November 27, 2022 and continue through December 2, 2023. In Year A, we read mostly from the Gospel of Matthew. In Year B, we read the Gospel of Mark and chapter 6 of the Gospel of John. In Year C, we read the Gospel of Luke. The Gospel of John is read during the Easter season in all three years. The first reading, usually from the Old Testament, reflects important themes from the Gospel reading. The second reading is usually from one of the epistles, a letter written to an early church community. These letters are read semi-continuously. Each Sunday, we pick up close to where we left off the Sunday before, though some passages are never read.

The weekday cycle is divided into two years, Year I and Year II. Year I is read in odd-numbered years (2023, 2025, etc.) and Year II is used in even-numbered years (2022, 2024, etc.) The Gospels for both years are the same. During the year, the Gospels are read semi-continuously, beginning with Mark, then moving on to Matthew and Luke. The Gospel of John is read during the Easter season. For Advent, Christmas, and Lent, readings are chosen that are appropriate to the season. The first reading on weekdays may be taken from the Old or the New Testament. Typically, a single book is read semi-continuously (i.e., some passages are not read) until it is finished and then a new book is started.

The year of the cycle does not change on January 1, but on the First Sunday of Advent (usually late November) which is the beginning of the liturgical year.

In addition to the Sunday and weekday cycles, the Lectionary provides readings for feasts of the saints, for common celebrations such as Marian feasts, for ritual Masses (weddings, funerals, etc.), for votive Masses, and for various needs. These readings have been selected to reflect the themes of these celebrations.

Cómo se organiza el Leccionario?

El Leccionario está organizado en dos ciclos, uno para los domingos y otro para los días laborables. El ciclo dominical se divide en tres años, etiquetados A, B y C. 2021 fue el Año B, 2022 es el Año C, el Año A será el 27 de noviembre de 2022 y continuará hasta el 2 de diciembre de 2023. En el año A, leemos principalmente del Evangelio de Mateo. En el año B, leemos el Evangelio de Marcos y el capítulo 6 del Evangelio de Juan. En el año C, leemos el Evangelio de Lucas. El Evangelio de Juan se lee durante la temporada de Pascua en los tres años. La primera lectura, generalmente del Antiguo Testamento, refleja temas importantes de la lectura del Evangelio. La segunda lectura es generalmente de una de las epístolas, una carta escrita a una comunidad de la iglesia primitiva. Estas cartas se leen semi-continuamente. Cada domingo, retomamos cerca de donde lo dejamos el domingo anterior, aunque algunos pasajes nunca se leen. El ciclo de los días laborables se divide en dos años, Año I y Año II. El año I se lee en los años impares (2023, 2025, etc.) y el año II se usa en los años pares (2022, 2024, etc.) Los Evangelios para ambos años son los mismos. Durante el año, los Evangelios se leen semi-continuamente, comenzando con Marcos, luego pasando a Mateo y Lucas. El Evangelio de Juan se lee durante el tiempo de Pascua. Para Adviento, Navidad y Cuaresma, se eligen lecturas que son apropiadas para la temporada. La primera lectura de lunes a viernes puede ser tomada del Antiguo o del Nuevo Testamento. Por lo general, un solo libro se lee semi-continuamente (es decir, algunos pasajes no se leen) hasta que se termina y luego se inicia un nuevo libro. El año del ciclo no cambia el 1 de enero, sino el primer domingo de Adviento (generalmente finales de noviembre), que es el comienzo del año litúrgico. Además de los ciclos dominicales y entre semana, el Leccionario proporciona lecturas para las fiestas de los santos, para celebraciones comunes como las fiestas marianas, para misas rituales (bodas, funerales, etc.), para misas votivas y para diversas necesidades. Estas lecturas han sido seleccionadas para reflejar los temas de estas celebraciones.
